To "keep your heart" amidst life"s chaos means to actively protect your emotional well-being by being mindful of your thoughts, actions, and the influences around you, essentially guarding against negativity and focusing on positive practices like self-care, gratitude, and seeking peace through spiritual practices, all while acknowledging that "keeping your heart" is a continuous effort, especially when facing challenges.

In our crazy, divided, distracted world, our hearts are crying out for peace—peace in our hearts, our bodies, and in our minds. I have had to limit my intake of news—and that includes political and exclusionary posts on social media as well because I can only take so much of the hate and intolerance. I have increased the amount of spiritually mindful time in each day and I am also paying close attention to moments when stress and frustration levels are rising. During those moments of rising negativity, I shut my eyes and try to focus inward, letting my mind repeat the mantra, "Peace in the air I breathe, peace in the soil I stand on, peace in the sounds that surround me. Peace in my heart. Peace in your heart."

This usually hits the reset button for me but sometimes we are called to help others "keep their heart" too because what is going on personally and globally can be too much to bear. Sometimes we are called to BE that mantra for others. We can be the peace in the air they breathe, be the peace in the soil they stand on, the peace in the sounds that surround them. We can share the peace in our heart so they can regain peace in theirs.

I encourage you to "keep your heart" during the rough days and months ahead. There will be times when you don't have the bandwidth to help others do the same and someone else will need to step up--that is what our community is for—we share the responsibility of loving one another through our joys and sorrows and fears.



Notes From Our Recent Meeting About ICE and Our Church

New executive orders have struck down the former ruling that immigration officials are barred from searching and detaining immigrants in Churches, Schools, and Hospitals. This means that churches are no longer a place of safety for people in our communities.

In February, a group of members and citizens met to discuss how we at All Peoples Church UU would respond if challenged by Immigration officials at our church.

First, we decided that we **OPPOSE** the ruling that churches can no longer be a place of sanctuary. We oppose the concept of taking people from a place of worship to be incarcerated, so we will resist this ruling to the extent that it is possible to safely do so. Although we can not legally stop officials if they have a valid warrant from entering the building, we can stick to the letter of the law and make sure that all people are informed so that they can act as needed.

Our suggestions are 1. Do not volunteer information on the immigration status of any member, friend, or guest.

2. Make sure that any immigration official wishing to search the building can show proper ID and a valid warrant signed by a judge. 3. Inform everyone in the church as soon as ICE enters the building. (We have walky-talkies to make this quick) giving time for those concerned to exit before the search. 4. Close the doors to private areas, offices, classrooms, etc. Requiring them to have a warrant to search these places. 5. Record and document everything they do. (Use your phone.) 6. Feel free to sing! (A protest song not only raises spirits, but can be used as a signal that it is time to sneak out the back door).

Since our doors are open to all on Sundays, it is important that we have sufficient greeters in case we are raided then. If you are willing to help man the doors, please contact Karl or Jo Burnham.
